J2B – JOURNEY TO BETHLEHEM



How do you present such a well-known story as the nativity so it has real meaning and renewed pertinence?

With Rev Rach's initiative, West Bridgford Methodist Church set about this challenge last December by presenting *"The Journey to Bethlehem"* Unusually, however, adults played the parts and presented this well-known story to over 350 local schoolchildren!

Over a week of productions, each audience journeyed with Jesse and Abigail as they travelled from Joseph's joinery shop to Bethlehem for the census. En-route they encountered the familiar characters (and a few extra allowed by poetic license!) as the story gradually unfolded with its dramatic high points; the fear instilled by the assertive Roman soldiers; the concerns shown by gentle shepherds on the hillside after the attacks from a couple of rogue bandits; the spectacular balcony appearance of the Angel Gabriel; the wise and worshipful Magi and the hospitable innkeeper and his wife offering everyone 'drinks on the house' at the *Wonky Donkey Inn*; before

arriving at the stable to witness Mary, Joseph and a real baby Jesus! (Baby Beatrice making her thespian debut at the tender age of only 4 weeks). The look on the children's (and adults!) faces was a joy to see.

The subsequent questions revealed the children's engagement and challenged the cast! The most popular character was to the Roman Soldier: Have the Romans ever lost a battle? "Certainly not!" was the credulous response. Many wanted to know how the Angel Gabriel had flown to the balcony while another asked if Gabriel had known the news first. Joseph was asked what he thought when the angel told him to call the baby Jesus while Mary was asked if it had taken long to have the baby!! One question – why did people have to pay taxes? – may have been to the soldiers but it could easily have been for a modern context.



For actors and production team, participating in the play certainly made us think even more deeply about the story and as one child said after the production "– That was awesome!". Maybe it was in one particularly profound moment, when baby Jesus (aka Beatrice) was revealed on the first day having just been sick, that it dawned afresh on audience and participants alike that Jesus was indeed 'a real baby' - in that moment too, the wonder of God, incarnate as a vulnerable baby is suddenly appreciated.

There was a real sense of church family in putting on the production and a palpable sense of community in how it was delivered. We are grateful that, this year, the Christmas story challenged and engaged us anew, but most of all, our thanks to God - the heart of the story and the inspiration for our Journey to Bethlehem.

A further 150 children from Candleby Lane school attended Christingle Services. We have

been holding these services for some 15 years. How many oranges, candles, yards of red ribbon etc. have been used during this time?

Once again, our Christmas Eve Candlelight Carol service was very well attended and it was good to see friends from around Cotgrave joining with us.

Following on from our Community Engagement Project receiving planning permission we have been discussing the detailed elements of the refurbishment work with our architect and his team. This has involved members of the team in some very long evening meetings. It is essential that details of the design are sorted out before the work is let for tender. Hopefully this will be at the end of January with a deadline for the return of the bids by early March.

We are now waiting to hear whether or not our remaining grant applications have been successful. All this has proved quite exciting as we see the results of the last five years coming to fruition.

Our Nativity service was 'instant' inviting any member of the congregation to dress up and come and take part. Plenty of those present in a full church took up the invitation and placed themselves in the story of the birth of Jesus. We kept reminding ourselves that Christmas is All About Jesus and hopefully that's the message that people took away.

The Nativity was only one part of a busy period leading up to Christmas. As well as the usual variety of services and other activities, we have been making some really important decisions about the future of Radcliffe Methodist Church. Many of you will know that for many years the church has been working towards a rebuilding project. Through the generosity and hard work of

members and friends significant amounts of money had been raised. Progress was however a lot less advanced than had been expected at this stage of the project. In November we decided that we would no longer demolish and rebuild the church building. Instead we will live within the existing structures of the building and use the money already raised to make substantial improvements to the premises.

The regeneration project has never just been about property and now we are working through the new future that God has for us in Radcliffe. To support this we are making opportunities for prayer with new prayer times in the church three times a week. We also look forward to joining in with the Thy Kingdom Come prayer initiative in Radcliffe with the other churches in Radcliffe later in the spring. Please can we ask for your prayers too, through this important time in the life of this church.

Wonderfully prophetic

Michael, the Methodist Youth President, reports from 3Generate 2017

Held at Pontins in Southport, from 24 to 26 November, 3Generate had God at its heart and was transformational for many attending.

More than 1,000 children, young people and young adults came together to speak to the Methodist Church about issues that are important to them, to tell the wider Church what they want to talk about and to transform.

In addition, 500 volunteers supported the event with a mix of children and youth leaders, presbyters, deacons, chairs of district and the President and Vice-President of the Conference. Our youngest 'volunteer' was six months old, coming along with her parents who shared a volunteering role!

This year the focus of 3Generate's conversations was based around seven key issues:

- saving the planet and looking after God's world
- mental health and developing well-being
- becoming people of peace, to set the example in an age of terror
- being good neighbours, living alongside people of other faiths
- combating poverty, sharing wealth and meeting needs
- reinventing the Church, being God's people in the future
- thriving in the mess, staying up when knocked down.

These issues came from groups of young people across the Connexion who helped to shape the event.

Children, young people and young adults explored what it means to be an agent of change in their own contexts. They spoke out on issues as part of their continued dialogue with the whole Church.

Discussions took place throughout the event at all age levels. The voice of young people was also captured to form the 3Generate manifestos and resolutions that will be presented at the 2018 Methodist Conference.

“The manifestos are particularly exciting as the children and young people are not just talking about what the Church should be like for them. These manifestos show that circuits and districts can take action to engage with their young people and these issues. It’s about young people becoming the decision-makers, not just advising. The points raised address young people’s vision of what the Church should be – for everyone. The 3Generate manifestos are a prophetic call to action.”
